NAME AND TYPE Air-O-Lite Lantern, Single Burner, Butane

MODEL NUMBER -- 5101

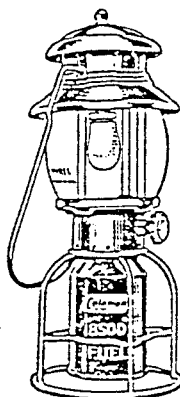
The Model 5101 was produced between 1955 and 1960 in response to requests for a lightweight, easily lighted lantern for picnics, patio use and other outdoor pursuits. The fuel used was a blend of LP-gases predominately butane.

See also description of Model 5120-731 LP-gas lantern which succeeded the Model 5101. The 5120 also burned butane in disposable metal cartridges.
